Jeff Olson, Vice President Connectivity & Co-Founder or re: Charge-e, provided an overview of the electric-micromobility landscape and evolving technology related to electric-assist and electric-powered micro vehicles, such as bicycles, scooters, one-wheels, etc. The sales of these vehicles have grown and are critical to the path of a low-carbon, affordable and more equitable transportation system. However, despite the growing popularity of these devices, public infrastructure has not kept paced while public electric vehicle charging for cars and other light-duty vehicles have proliferated with the help of federal and state government incentives and subsidies.

Jeff discussed the need to include e-micromobility in efforts to electrify the transportation system, including provisions for public charging infrastructure, consideration of micromobility in Complete Streets ordinances, and ongoing active transportation planning. There were discussions related to integrating e-micromobility charging into existing infrastructure, such as streetlights. E-bikes and scooters typically require a 20-amp circuit and use significantly less power than electric cars. There may be potential opportunities working with schools and utilities to expanding e-micromobility and supporting infrastructure. Examples of municipalities requiring publicly available e-bike and scooter charging would be helpful to local planners and officials. There are still questions related to regulating use and speed, both of which remain to be challenges for local governments. As best practices are developed, CDTC will share them with the Committee.

 - \$1,569,539 to the Town of Bethlehem to construct a paved multi-use path along Cherry Avenue Extension.

NYSDOT to Host Virtual Public Meeting on Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Plan

NYSDOT, in partnership with the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority, announced that a virtual public meeting will be held on July 20th, 2022, at 1 p.m. to provide information and receive feedback on the development of the State's National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Plan that will advance New York's nation-leading climate agenda. The NEVI program provides dedicated funding to states to support the strategic deployment of electric vehicle Direct Current Fast Charging (DCFC) infrastructure to establish an interconnected network for reliable charging. Register for this virtual public meeting and get more information on the program here. The initial emphasis of the program is on making available publicly accessible Direct Current Fast Charging for passenger EVs at intervals of no more than 50 miles apart within 1 travel mile of the designated corridors, with an emphasis on locations near Interstate highway exits. New York is expected to receive \$175 million over five years. Before funding can be spent, the NYSDOT must submit a National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure Deployment Plan that describes how the funding will be used to the Joint Office of Energy and Transportation by August 1. The State recently launched a website to provide more information on the NEVI program.

FHWA Publishes NPRM for the NEVI Formula Program – Federal Rulemaking in Process

On June 22, 2022, FHWA published a <u>Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM)</u> in the Federal Register to establish regulations setting minimum standards and requirements for projects funded under the NEVI Formula Program and projects for the construction of publicly accessible electric vehicle (EV) chargers under certain statutory authorities. The proposed standards and requirements would apply to:

- The installation, operation, or maintenance of EV charging infrastructure;
- The interoperability of EV charging infrastructure;
- Traffic control device or on-premises signage acquired, installed, or operated in concert with EV charging infrastructure;
- Data, including the format and schedule for the submission of such data;
- Network connectivity of EV charging infrastructure; and
- Information on publicly available EV charging infrastructure locations, pricing, real-time availability, and accessibility through mapping applications.

USDOT Announces \$195 Million for the Reconnecting Communities Pilot Program – Funding Available



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On June 30, 2022, the USDOT <u>announced</u> the availability of \$195 million for the new <u>Reconnecting Communities Pilot Program</u> in Fiscal Year 2022. Funding will support planning grants and capital construction grants, as well as technical assistance, to restore community connectivity through the removal, retrofit, mitigation, or replacement of eligible transportation infrastructure facilities. **The USDOT will host an informational webinar on Thursday, July 14, 2022 at 12:00 pm Eastern**.

USDOT Announces \$2.4 Billion for the Bridge Investment Program – Funding Available

On June 10, 2022, the USDOT <u>announced</u> the availability of approximately \$2.4 billion for the new Bridge Investment Program in Fiscal Year 2022. FHWA is soliciting applications for three categories of funding opportunities: (1) Planning; (2) Bridge Projects (projects with eligible costs less than \$100 million); and (3) Large Bridge Projects (projects with eligible costs greater than \$100 million). Planning applications must be submitted by July 25, 2022; large bridge project applications must be submitted by August 9, 2022; and the other bridge project applications must be submitted by September 8, 2022. USDOT Launches the Thriving Communities Initiative – Technical Assistance

The USDOT recently launched the <u>Thriving Communities Initiative</u> to provide technical assistance and capacity building resources to improve and foster thriving communities through transportation improvements. This includes a new online portal, the <u>DOT Navigator</u>, to help communities understand the best ways to apply for grants, and to plan for and deliver transformative infrastructure projects and services. The DOT Navigator provides resources to help public agencies and other transportation stakeholders understand the Federal grant-making process and key Federal requirements. One of the key features is a <u>mapping tool</u> for identifying transportation disadvantaged census tracts. In addition, the USDOT is partnering with the Department of Housing and Urban Development to improve the coordination of housing and transportation planning to advance residents' access to opportunity and increase housing supply.
